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### What is a persuasive letter?

A persuasive letter is a letter that tries to convince readers to believe or do something. A persuasive letter has a strong point of view about an idea or a problem. It includes facts and examples to support an opinion, and it usually suggests a solution.

## What is the purpose of a persuasive letter?

People write persuasive letters to "sway," or change the minds of, their readers. They want readers to see their points of view. They may want readers to take action, too. A good persuasive writer knows his or her audience. He or she knows what facts and reasons might change the reader's mind.

### Who is the audience for a persuasive letter?

People write persuasive letters to all kinds of people: parents, friends, citizens, business leaders, world leaders, and others.

### How do you read a persuasive letter?

Keep in mind that the writer wants you to support his or her position. Ask yourself:

1. What is this writer's position, or opinion?

2. Does he or she support it with facts and good reasons?

3. Do I agree with him or her?

Uses facts and evidence to make a case

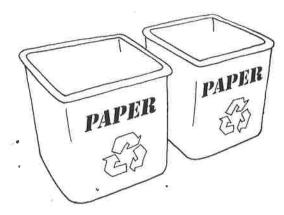
Persuasive Letter

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Dear Mom and Dad,

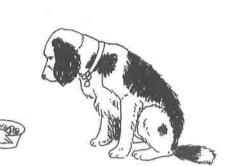
Ever since I can remember, I've wished for a dog. I love animals more than anything except for you two. I even want to be a **veterinarian** when I grow up.
